### Background

Planning for the First Eastern Africa Youth Conference dates back to Ethiopia in late 2009 when the idea was floated during the 5th Harambee Africa Training. At first, all eyes were on Sudan that was courting the idea of a referendum for the south to secede from the north. The challenge then was "how do we strengthen the young IofC team in Sudan to have an impact as the country prepared for a peaceful transition?" However, as the discussions advanced, ideas shifted from Sudan as a single entity to countries in the region, bearing in mind common challenges faced. That was the spark that ignited the fire now known as the Eastern Africa Youth Conference.

### Vision

An Africa that is economically prosperous, politically vibrant, ecologically sustainable and socially inclusive; a continent of people who celebrate their cultural heritage and diversity, bringing hope to the world. (Developed by Harambee 5 participants 2009 in Ethiopia and adopted by EAYC)

### The Event

Wednesday February 9th 2011, Kenya opened its gates to about 70 young visionaries from the Eastern Africa Region (Kenya, Uganda, Tanzania, Rwanda, Burundi, Ethiopia, Somalia, North and South Sudan) gathered under the theme "Beyond Me…it's time to act!" to chart the way forward for the challenges they are facing in their countries. Through daily morning reflections, delegates got to share on the four moral absolutes of IofC –

Absolute Purity, Honesty, Unselfishness and Love - that challenged them to take proactive actions towards personal and public ethical leadership. Personal reflections and introspection bring out the uniqueness aspects of this conference. Delegates got a chance to connect with themselves. Plenary sessions; "Economic Empowerment", "Social Responsibility" and "Responsible Leadership",

had speakers with a wealth of knowledge coupled with inspiring experiences and seasoned with the authority with which they presented their challenge to the new generation of change-makers.

### Beyond me... its time to act!

"There is no youth empowerment without the youth!" These were the words of Ken Walusala, President Regional Multifunctional Youth forum and the International Conference on the Great Lakes Region who graced the opening ceremony.

He further challenged the youth to be actively involved in the process of policy formulation and implementation in their respective countries. Also present at the opening forum was Julius Khakula, Chairman of IofC Kenya who shared in great depth on Africa's potential "Africa can be just, Africa can be refuge for humanity, Africa is full of strength and compassion" he said. He also highlighted the depth of natural resource and latency found in the region. Sarah Ongige, a representative of the Ministry of Youth and Sports from the Rift region challenged the youth to use their numbers wisely and not to destroy the potential they have.

The opening ceremony laid ground for a highly interactive dialogue dubbed "East Africa speaks". In this session the delegates explored the root causes of the challenges facing the youth in Eastern Africa, envisioned a desirable vision for the future of the region and identified their roles as individuals on how to confront these challenges. The following seven issues were identified;

- Unemployment Lack of job opportunities has made the youths engage in ills within the society.
   E.g. Substance abuse, crime
- Violence Absence of true peace. Constant conflicts with neighbours and selves.
- Moral decadence -Ethical relativism and moral decadence have contributed greatly to the vices in the society today. eg pornography
- Ignorance \illiteracy Contributed by a wanting education system.
- Youth marginalization Especially in decision making and in taking leadership positions.
- Poverty Underuse, abuse and misuse of available resources.
- Poor Education system One that is not relevant to the needs of the youth in Eastern Africa.

### **Economic Empowerment**

Chrispine Oduor, a Strategic Plans Consultant and Rachel Ajiambo (Kilimo Trust Uganda), laid bare the statistics of unemployment of the youth, and revealed financial principles of economic freedom like saving and investment. The delegates were challenged on their thinking about economic empowerment as well as the attitude towards work. "No one can empower you, you only can empower yourself. Let's have proper attitude towards work... Develop proper work ethics...Whatever you are doing, do it to the best." Said Rachel. Dr. Hongo, an expert in Effective School Management, shared his belief that 'Africa's nakedness can only be solved from the head'. He further challenged the young visionaries on how well they maximized what they already have; "What are we doing with our brains, our hearts and our resources?" he asked.

### Responsible Leadership

Irresponsible leadership has been blamed by many for the problems in many African countries. In this light, George Gachara, a youth worker and and author, together with Peter Ndolo, Trust Cordinator Sanchat, illuminated the meaning and significance of service oriented leadership. The

### Social Responsibility

Dr. Jim, Mcfie, a lecturer at Strathmore University, Bedan Mbugua, the General Manager for Royal Media Services and Dan Mugera, a motivational speaker from Mombasa, Kenya explored the concept of social responsibility. Well, many of us agree that there is lack of sound governance in the Eastern Africa region which might be the cause of our problems, but there is more to these problems than just governance. "Let's be realistic, let's be honest with what the real problem is." said Dr. Mc Fie. "We are lazy; we want money, just money!"

he continued. Dan said that many Africans have lost the values they held so dear back in the days. He called on the youth to live their words, beliefs and values "When I speak, I speak my convictions, my values and my beliefs and when I act, I act my convictions, my values and my beliefs". He also encouraged them to do what is good "We have to start doing good because doing good is good!" he said. 'Social responsibility must emanate from competence and character - the key requirements in social responsibility. Young people must think quickly and act now' were the wise words from Bedan Mbugua.

### **Peaceful Procession**

On the 3rd day of the conference, the delegates held a peaceful procession, from the conference centre through Nakuru town to the Nyayo Gardens, Nakuru. They wore T-shirts proclaiming 'It's time to act' and carried slogans like 'Corruption is a moral issue' and 'To raise the standard, I must raise my standards'. The street demostration was a climax to the conference deliberations as youths sang over and over: 'We are the change generation and we'll impact the nation...For change is within us', marching their way into the peaceful town.

This was a wake-up call to young people in the town to live responsibly for the sake of their future and that of coming generations. While at the gardens, Deputy Provincial Commissioner Rift Valley Province, Ole Saya, addressed the delegates and members of pubic that had gathered there calling upon youths in the region to use peaceful

methods in seeking to address their needs rather than resorting to violent means. The processon culminated in a tree planting exercise at the St. Mary's Pastoral center after the march.

What stood out in Nakuru was the bond of commitment between those leading the action and their insistence that inner change is the driver for social change.

### Workshops

For 2 days the delegates had the opportunity to participate in one of the four workshops;

Youth and Peace Building by Nelly Njoki, Using exercises, role plays and discussions, this workshop walked with the delegates in making peace practical, by identifying youth peace concerns, understanding frameworks for youth in peace and acquiring knowledge and skills in conflict transformation.

Communication Workshop by Mike Kuria, a senior lecturer at Daystar University, took people through 'What and How of Communication for Social Transformation' Through short presentations, open discussions and other interactive methodologies, and challenged participants to set an agenda and strategize on how to communicate it bearing in mind the sensitivity to other different cultures, gender, age etc.

# Entrepreneurship for Youth Empowerment

Workshop by Tonnie Mello, the Founder and CEO of Entrepreneurship for Youth Empowerment, This workshop answered questions like: What is youth entrepreneurship? What is the state of youth and young adult entrepreneurs in the East African region? How to finance and support youth businesses — Youth, Communities, government, donors and private sector involvement. And Does wealth creation for national development really exist? (business to build communities and the Eastern African region)

Call to Action Workshop by Mike Brown, Initiatives of Change Australia. He helped the delegates to link personal life and values to be BIG issues like ending Poverty and Hunger, responding to the Climate Change crisis, reducing War and Conflict. These were issues highlighted in the 'Caux Call to Action' which was drafted in Caux, Switzerland in 2010.

### **Action Steps**

The delegates took sometime to brainstorm on action steps that need to be undertaken to address the issues identified earlier. Below are some of the solutions suggested

- Adoption of a relevant education system which meets the needs of the youth in the region.
- Peace and security through dialogue, reconciliation and trust building.
- Conduct more Eastern Africa youth Conferences to enhance the spirit of unity and continual dialogue.
- Encourage youth representation in dialogue with the Government.
- Creating programs that encourage individual action against any form of violence.
- Introducing peace and conflict transformation modules in the school curriculum from an early stage.
- Training of key community\grassroot youth leaders on alternative dispute resolution
- Holding of campaigns which create awareness about human rights in member states by holding

- community meetings, conferences and dialogues on human rights and holding talk shows
- Integration of moral education in school curriculums

#### **Achievements**

- Successfully mobilized and created a strong network of young change makers from the region.
- Resolutions made to some of the challenges identified during the 4-day forum.
- Set a firm foundation for future conferences.
