In 2010 Rosemary was invited to address an agricultural exhibition in Western France. This gathering was organized by the International Association for "Ecologically Intensive Farming". 15,000 farmers came to learn about alternative ways of farming, at a time when chemicals and fuel prices were rising. She was very well received, showing how relevant African experiences could also be in Europe.

Rosemary was encouraged by the phrase used by Farmers' Dialogue "Think Globally, Act Locally to feed the world" emphasizing that each farmer has responsibility in feeding the world. At Manor House Agricultural Centre, students are briefed on Farmers' Dialogue's vision of sustainable food production, which includes Biointensive Agricultural emphasizing the use of low cost technology, with potential to increase yields on small farms. Concepts of viable agriculture are effectively disseminated to many farming organizations achieving sustainable food production.
